## **Platform Profiles**

- Summit of Women and Peace. The Summit was created during the negotiation with the FARC-EP in a women's meeting to demand their formal representation at the Negotiation Table. Up to now, three National Summits have been held and the Mission financially supported the holding of the last National Summit and part of the regional sessions through UNDP with extrabudgetary funds. It is necessary to follow up on the results of the last regional sessions. Today the Summit is composed of the following organizations:

- Mujeres por la Paz (Maria Eugenia Ramirez).

The Summit makes periodic reports on the follow-up of the Peace Agreement. They sometimes receive financial support from UN Women and are one of the main dialogue partners of the Mission. https://www.facebook.com/Cumbremujeresypaz/

- **Género en la paz (GPAZ).** Several of the GPAZ organizations were at the Summit and later formed their own alliance, some with the vision that it would be independent of the cooperation. GPAZ's objective is to monitor gender-related issues in the Peace Agreement. They issue report documents on the gender approach in the Peace Agreement. They are also an important interlocutor of the Mission. Their members are:

- Cinco Claves. Several of the GPAZ organizations are part of Cinco Claves, which is why in the initial spokesmanship of the meetings with the SRSG they are given joint spokesmanship. Cinco Claves was created as a platform to influence and monitor the approach to sexual violence in the context of the conflict. It has produced several documents on this issue and on the approach to addressing sexual violence in the SJP. In addition to the organizations that make up GPAZ, DeJusticia and Women's Link are also part of Cinco Claves.
- Alianza 1325. It is a recent alliance for influencing the development of the National Action Plan for Women, Peace and Security, which is currently underway. The members of this alliance are:

- Instancia Especial de Mujeres. There are 8 members with one pair of representatives each (16 women) of rural women, indigenous women, Afro women, women victims, national organizations, territorial organizations, LGBT women. For this second term, the inclusion of women involved in the process of reintegration was achieved, and while they do not have the right to vote, they do participate. They are mainly in the territory. The Instancia meets periodically with the support of cooperation and they coordinate with CSIVI through the Presidential Counselor for Stabilization and Consolidation. The Instancia develops periodic follow-up reports on the 51 indicators of the Framework Implementation Plan and the gender approach to the Peace Agreement. - Women's International Democratic Federation (WIDF). They are, together with Sweden and UN Women, the international observers of the gender component of the Peace Agreement. WIDF was a civilian ally of the FARC-EP during the guerilla movements. They are now under the leadership of Chila Pineda. WIDF contributes in part to the coordination of CONAMU.
